

RENTING WITH YOUR PET

Give yourself time!
There are plenty of dog friendly
landlords out there, but it can take
weeks to find the rental you need. You
must be resourceful and persistent.



Be understanding!
The landlord may have had bad
experiences with pets in the past. Your
polite, calm, can-do attitude can make
all the difference in helping a property
owner decide if they want to hear the
solutions you're going to offer them.



Letters of recommendation can go a long way! Consider asking previous landlords, trainers, veterinarians, and neighbors to explain how well liked your dog is and how responsible you are.




First impressions count!
It can help in some cases to bring your well trained pet with you to meet the landlord. Leave them with a friend outside while you introduce yourself. Can't bring your pet? Have a video of them on your phone and offer to share it.



Consider purchasing your own Renter's Insurance or offering an additional pet deposit- these will cover your pet and let prospective landlords know you mean business.

PET RESUME





- Dog's health status: Spay/Neutered? Vaccinated? Name and contact of your veterinarian.
- Describe arrangements you make for your dog while you're at work (crate trained? doggy daycare?) or away on vacation.
- Describe how and where you exercise your dog.
- Describe how you plan to take care of the property.

ALWAYS BE HONEST



Never try to hide your pet or sign a lease that doesn't allow pet. You're much safer if you stay honest and if you have the landlord add your pet's name and breed to the lease. If you decide to hide your pet, you're at the mercy of ill-informed neighbors who might turn you in! Landlords are more likely to evict dogs when they're pressured by neighbors or if they're caught off guard.

Breed Issues? Confirm your dog's breed through a DNA test and provide a copy to your landlord. Many mixed breed dogs are mislabeled.

BE AN AWESOME TENANT



Lay rugs down to avoid scratching the hardwoods. Use a dog crate to prevent unexpected damage, like chewed door frames or urine marking while you're away at work. Pick up after your dog. Don't let them bark non-stop or annoy others. Don't let them run loose. Let willing neighbors meet your well behaved pet so they can support you in your ownership. Make it your mission to help them realize you're a thoughtful, responsible dog owner with a well loved pet and your landlord will happily give you a great reference for your next rental.
